President's Report

Following our AGM, Sana Zreika led us in a virtual PL session to become familiar with the **Modern Languages K–10 Syllabus**. Participants had the opportunity to unpack the syllabus and prepare for implementation in 2024. Teachers interacted in break out rooms to align outcomes to activities and were provided with resources including a sample assessment notification which aligns with the new outcomes and demonstrates how the skills can be combined and assessed. We aim to continue on from this session with some Primary and Secondary workshops for members to collaborate and share teaching and learning programs and assessments.

In Term 1 this year we engaged the internationally renowned presenter, Joe Dale to present a webinar on the **"Possibilities and Practicalities of Chat GPT in Language Teaching and Learning"**. Feedback from the 70 participants was very positive. There were many takeaways and lots of discussion in the chat. I am sure many of the ideas presented have been implemented by participants. Thank you to Anthea Wawryka, our PD Officer for coordinating valuable PL opportunities.

The 17th year of **Linguafest short film competition** has been launched and we hope to see some **"history" (theme)** being made this year. Make sure to incorporate a **"necklace" as the signature item**. This initiative continues to be a wonderful celebration and showcase for the passion teachers and students have for languages. Thank you to our Linguafest convenor, Sophia Higgins, especially for initiating the Plurilingual category, now in the second year after its successful uptake last year. Films are due 15 September 2023.

MLTA NSW is proud to have offered a range of grants, awards and scholarships for both teachers and students this year.

Our Teacher Mentor Program has been operating since 2021 and continues to have an ongoing impact, supporting mentees as well as building leadership capacity in the voluntary mentors. It provides an opportunity for everyone in the program to collaborate and improve, share and develop their practice. The teacher mentor program also provides teachers working towards Highly Accomplished and Lead Teacher accreditation to build leadership capacity which otherwise may not be possible if they are sole language educators in their own school. Thank you to Coreena Allen for leading this initiative so well.

Denise Soos Scholarships are awarded to students in Year 10 who intend to study a Language in Stage 6. The recipients receive a scholarship which is to be used for resources to support their language studies. We received 18 applications and awarded 5 scholarships to the recipients who are studying the languages at:



Are you looking for a last-minute film idea for your class? It is not too late to start creating a film for the 2023 Linguafest competition. We would love to receive an entry from you!

This article includes a variety of ideas for you and your students to consider. All of these would benefit from storyboarding and collaboration if time allows. They also lend themselves to critical and creative thinking. There will no doubt be many riveting discussions in language classrooms across the state.

Although a fascinating theme, history can at times lend itself to negativity, wars, ill-treatment of others and the like. Please keep in mind that all films must be G-Rated. They must not include violence, offensive language, and racist remarks. If in doubt, ask yourself. Should Kindergarten students be watching this?

Creating a 2-minute film with the above constraints may be a challenge but it is achievable. Here are some ideas to get your classroom conversation started.

The history of your language and cultures

We all know and appreciate that learning a language goes hand in hand with learning about the cultures, history, and geography of the associated countries. Your film could:

- be a documentary or mockumentary. How the (K Pop Singer / band) became famous
- depict a living situation. The Indian wedding that stopped a city
- recount the life of a famous person related to your language. A Day in the Life of Mad King Ludwig II of Bavaria



Linguafest 2023

The history of an item related to your language's culture

Concentrating on one small (but significant) aspect may work for your class. Consider food, inventions, and art.

- Food Why do the French eat Escargots?
- Invention The development of the first Manga comic.
- Art The inspiration behind a Frida Kahlo painting from Frida's perspective

A history lesson OR a language lesson about history

Create a film about a school event or something that happened in a lesson.

- Do the students stay in the classroom, or do they go back in time?
- What is the complication of the story? Make it significant.
- Create interesting characters.

Last month, last week and yesterday!

Given the depth of possibilities on offer from the theme of history, if you go down this more 'straightforward' route, ensure it is as rich and interesting as possible. Develop your characters well and ensure you have a strong narrative.

Delve deeper when considering your angle


Students could potentially develop the setting and plot of their film based on one or more of these reflective questions:

- Describe your first memorable encounter with another culture.
- Describe a first experience with culture shock. How did you get past this?
- What place in the world would you like to discover? Set your film here.
- When you say what interests you about other countries. What specifically interests you?

Linguafest Submission Tips

Before submitting your film, please ensure you have done the following:


- Your film must be 2 minutes maximum. Films exceeding 2 minutes will be disqualified.
- **Films must be G-Rated.** As primary schools participate in Linguafest, Kindergarten (4–6-year-old), students may watch the screening. Please ensure your film does not contain violence, drug use, racist remarks, and bad language.
- You must include English subtitles. These need to be legible.
- You can only submit one film per language, per stage.
- Have a strong narrative and interesting characters. Consider storyboarding and brainstorming character traits with your class.
- **English is not counted as a language.** Keep English to a minimum or avoid it altogether. Linguafest promotes the use of the languages other than English that our students are learning.
- There is **no limit to the number of languages** in your Plurilingual film.
- Languages in Plurilingual films **do not** have to be represented equally.
- Please submit each film with an entry form. These can be accessed on the MLTANSW website. https://www.mltansw.asn.au/linguafest

Why HALT?


RATIONALE


Why HALT?

An Example of a Reading Assessment Task

I would like to share one of the assessment tasks – Reading and Responding – I designed for 2022 HSC Russian Continuers Trial paper at the Secondary College of Languages.

Topic: Arts and Entertainment (The Russian-speaking Communities)

Outcomes to be assessed

Reading

- 3.1 conveys the gist of texts and identifies specific information
- 3.2 identifies the tone, purpose, context and audience
- 3.3 summarises the main ideas
- 3.4 compares and contrasts aspects of texts

Read the text, then answer in ENGLISH the question that follows.

"Импрессионизм – моя жизнь" в ЦМИИ

В одном из главных музеев города – Центральном музее изобразительных искусств (ЦМИИ) – в течение двух месяцев впервые пройдет выставка под названием «Импрессионизм – моя жизнь». 
Sample answer

The writer of the article persuades/encourages the public to attend the exhibitions by using statistical information – convenient opening hours ("10.30 **утра** - 8.30 **вечера")** and a good number of paintings ("более 30 полотен"). The exhibition will cater for a variety of people's interests ("профессиональные гиды, мастер-классы для детей и взрослых, книжная акция").

The article also includes the number of attendees ("более 50 000") which is growing in comparison with the previous year, so it shows the readers that it must be worthwhile visiting. The museum café offers delicious food ("Борщ, окрошка, пирожки с мясом, Бефстроганов, торт "Наполеон"").

The writer of the article uses promising, inviting tone and imperative sentences ("...покупайте билеты", "...приходите к нам"). The fact that there will be free light refreshments, discounts for students and seniors, and free travel by public transport, might also entice people to attend. The use of modal verb ("должны помнить") is important to remember about the COVID restrictions. The words of positive connotation ("поклонникам повезет", "удачные часы", "обязательно") contribute to the inviting and persuading tone.

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
